For the 4th year in a row, I will be teaching at YARNOVER, the [Minnesota Knitting Guild's](#) annual day of workshops. This year my workshop will focus on the creation of a wonderful airy-fairy DOMINO SCARF FROM JAPAN. Lots of good lessons about color and balance as you decide on color selections plus, you get to swatch—successfully—without knitting a single stitch!

The day after Yarnover, Sunday April 18, I will be at [The Yarnery](#) with my BOHUS STICKNING workshop so if any of you have been wanting to immerse yourself in this cultural knitting tradition, please contact The Yarnery to sign up. The class project is a pair of beautiful wristlets done in authentic yarns from Sweden.



Later in April I will be at [Midwest Masters](#) where you can learn to knit with beads and make a sweet SACHET (fill it with lavender from your garden), delve into JAPANESE SHORTROWS for perfectly shaped



shoulders or; if you are looking for an in-depth experience, my LAPLAND HAND GARMENTS workshop



will be a two-day affair in Neenah. This means you will really 'get' the technique and be ready to make mittens after the class wristlets but you will also have time to learn a few multi-color cast-ons

and the wonderful braids that often decorate mitten cuffs from the Nordic and Baltic countries.
